While the author *was* able to obtain a listing from SFAF of the dollar amounts of awards made for AIDS Walk 2000 by sneakily having a co-worker call SFAF to request the list be faxed to her, SFAF has not yet released the narrative descriptions to the public listing the beneficiary organizations' purpose and the purpose of the grant awards for AIDS Walk 2000.

This author had to trick SFAF into releasing the awardee information for AIDS Walk 2000, as SFAF tends to stonewall me by delaying for 30- to 90-days before responding to information requests, *if* they respond to me at all (which silence is their preferred mode these days; notably, Lonnie Payne, Chair of SFAF Board of Directors has become wholly uncooperative regarding my requests for information since August 2000).

When the narrative descriptions document for AIDS Walk 2000 becomes available in May 2002, this report will be updated on the Internet.

Over 20,000 people will take to Golden Gate Park Sunday, July 15th, to raise money for HIV and AIDS by participating in AIDS Walk 2001 sponsored by the San Francisco AIDS Foundation (SFAF). Each year, 32 or more Bay Area AIDS Service Organizations are listed, ostensibly, as beneficiaries; they lend their good names, in part, to help increase Walk participation. But have you ever wondered where your fundraising dollars go?

Many smaller AIDS organizations depend on fair allocations of the AIDS Walk funds for a significant portion of their budgets. It has become very difficult for smaller organizations to raise money independently because of the larger, highly publicized AIDS Walk. We all — from gay men, to tennis mom's, to grandmother's grieving the loss of grandchildren to AIDS — would like to believe that the money raised goes *directly* towards helping those in need. If that were the case, the California Attorney General would *not* issue a report each year listing fundraising abuses in which very little of the money raised for non-profit agencies actually reaches the beneficiary organizations. So, too, with the AIDS Walk.

For the past three years, fully 27% of the amount of total funds raised goes toward pulling the Walk together, by way of "event overhead expenses"; of the \$3.8 million raised at AIDS Walk 2000, at least \$1,025,000 went to event overhead. Then, SFAF retained 46% (\$1.7 million) for itself, leaving \$1,025,000 or 27% (The Balance) of the \$3.8 million to share with the 36 "beneficiary" organizations.

Of The Balance, SFAF's affiliate non-profit, the HIV Prevention Project, whose main program is needle-exchange for injection drug users, received \$320,000, fully 31.2% of The Balance available for remaining beneficiaries. SFAF also first favors its three partnership organizations (Project Inform, the Shanti Project, and UCSF AIDS Health Project); between the four partners/affiliates, \$482,500 (47.1%) of The Balance was reserved for them. Another \$2.4% (\$25,000) was shipped off to two Washington organizations, leaving a scant \$517,500, (50.5%, of The Balance) to be shared by the remaining 30 Bay Area organizations. An additional \$95,500 (9.3%) of The Balance went to five organizations for needle exchange and substance abuse programs, leaving 25 Bay Area organizations vying for \$422,000 (the "Adjusted Balance"). The Adjusted Balance represents a mere 11% of the \$3.8 million raised available to the 25 organizations. Some slice of the pie! Or was SFAF telling these 25: "Let Them Eat Cake"?

I am not opposed to needle exchange *per se*; however, much of the funds earmarked for this goes to "advocacy" (lobbying) and management, rather then to actual needles. As well, 40.5%, or \$415,500 of The Balance shared in 2000 went to needle exchange organizations, despite the fact that as of March 2001, injection drug users account for only 19% of the City's AIDS cases, whereas 76.8% of AIDS cases occur in non-injecting gay or bisexual men, who receive a disproportionate slice of The Balance shared with the community.

As for AIDS Walk 1999, fully 28.2% (\$380K) of The (1999) Balance "shared" with beneficiary organizations was funneled to Washington to influence legislation and lobby Congress, which is a prohibited expense by non-profit organizations.

How SFAF spends the money it keeps is as equally appalling. First, there's the perennial scandal about high salaries: SFAF's Executive Director, Pat Christen, starting July 1st, earns darned close to \$250,000 annually. According to SFAF's just-released tax return ending June 2000, and assuming two 6% annual raises, the top five highest-paid employees, effective July 1st, are probably being paid a combined \$736,500; these six people consume nearly \$1 million a year in salaries.

Things get much worse in SFAF's accountability of funds: according to SFAF's just-released budget for July '01 to June '02, SFAF is raising this year's fundraising budget by \$1.4 million, increasing its Prevention Services Staff and Volunteer Development and Travel budget by \$373,334, and increasing its Programs and Contracts Management Program Development budget by \$1,389,761 — all at the same time that it is cutting \$165,047 from its Housing Programs, including cutting \$130K in housing vouchers, and cutting \$305K across the three-category HIV Services and Treatment Support budget. Finally, over the past 18 months, SFAF has spent well in excess of \$670,000 on a print media and transit ad campaign.

I have written a report regarding a five-year history of AIDS Walk funds; it will be posted on the Internet before Sunday at www.accountabilityproject.com. Before donating directly to SFAF, I urge you to read this report.

I strongly support participating in raising funds for HIV and AIDS; however, if you want your money to reach *people*, not the SFAF "*machine*," do *not* have your sponsors write checks endorsed to either SFAF or *AIDS Walk SF* (AWSF). Rather, donate *directly* to beneficiary organizations by sending funds you raise to them, not to SFAF. Then write SFAF; tell it how much you raised, who you donated to, and the reasons why you bypassed SFAF as middleman. Finally, write Board Chair Lonnie Payne in care of SFAF and tell him you will continue bypassing SFAF in future years until it becomes *fully* accountable to the public and until it gets a grip on excessive expenses.
